

Statement of intent

Naburn CE Primary is committed to ensuring equal opportunities for all pupils, regardless of financial circumstances, and has established the following policy and procedures to ensure that no child is discriminated against by our offering of school trips, activities and educational extras.

In addition, we are committed to adhering to legal requirements regarding charging for school activities, and meeting all statutory guidance provided by the DfE.

We promise:

- Not to charge for education provided during school hours.
- To inform parents on low incomes and in receipt of relevant benefits of the support available to them when asking for contributions.

Please note that while this policy may be more or less generous than the LA's, we have ensured it meets the requirements of the law.

1. Legal framework

1.1. This policy will have consideration for, and be compliant with, the following legislation and statutory guidance:

- Education Act 1996
- The Charges for Music Tuition (England) Regulations 2007
- The Education (Prescribed Public Examinations) (England) Regulations 2010
- DfE (2018) 'Charging for school activities'
- DfE (2020) 'Governance handbook'
- 'Our Funding Agreement'

1.2. This policy operates in conjunction with the following school policies and procedures:

- Complaints Policy

2. Charging for education

2.1. We will not charge parents for:

- Admission applications.
- Education provided during school hours.
- Education provided outside school hours if it is part of the national curriculum, or part of RE.
- Instrumental or vocal tuition, unless provided at the request of the pupil's parents.
- Marking of SATs papers.

2.2. We may charge parents for the following:

- Materials, books, instruments or equipment, where they desire their child to own them
- Optional extras
- Music tuition (in certain circumstances)
- Vocational tuition (in certain circumstances)
- Certain early years provision
- Use of community facilities

2.3. If a parent/carer wishes to apply for a remission of charge a form is available from the school office. Authorisation for such remission will be made by the headteacher. In the event a remission of charge is declined parents/carers have the right to appeal in writing to the Chair of Governors whose decision will be final.

3. Optional extras

3.1. We may charge parents for the following optional extras:

- Education provided outside of school time that is not:

- Part of the national curriculum
 - RE
- Transport, other than that arranged by the LA for the pupil to be provided with education
 - Board and lodging for a pupil on a residential visit
 - Extended day services offered to pupils
- 3.2. When calculating the cost of optional extras, the school will only take into account the cost, or an appropriate proportion of the cost, of the following:
- Materials, books, instruments or equipment provided in relation to the optional extra
 - Buildings and accommodation
 - Employment of non-teaching staff
 - Teaching staff (including TAs) under contracts for services purely to provide an optional extra
 - Teaching staff employed to provide vocal tuition or tuition in playing a musical instrument
- 3.3. The school will not charge in excess of the actual cost of providing the optional extra divided by the number of participating pupils.
- 3.4. The school will not charge a subsidy for any pupils wishing to participate but whose parents are unwilling or unable to pay the full charge.
- 3.5. If a proportion of the activity takes place during school hours, the school will not charge for the cost of alternative provision for those not participating.
- 3.6. Participation in any optional activity will be on the basis of parental choice and a willingness to meet the charges. Therefore, parental agreement is a prerequisite for the provision of an optional extra.
- 3.7. If a charge is to be made for a particular activity, such as optional extras, parents will be informed of how the charge will be calculated.

4. Voluntary contributions

- 4.1. The school may, from time-to-time, ask for voluntary contributions towards the benefit of the school or school activities. If an activity cannot be funded without voluntary contributions, the school will make this clear to parents at the outset. The school will also make it clear that there is no obligation for parents to make a contribution, and notify parents whether assistance is available.
- 4.2. No pupil will be excluded from an activity simply because their parents are unwilling or unable to pay. If a parent is unwilling or unable to pay, their child will still be given an equal opportunity to take part in the activity. If insufficient voluntary contributions are raised to fund an activity, and the school cannot fund it via another source, the activity will be cancelled.

- 4.3. The school will strive to ensure that parents do not feel pressurised into making voluntary contributions.

5. Music tuition

- 5.1. Music tuition is the only exception to the rule that all education provided during school hours must be free. The Charges for Music Tuition (England) Regulations 2007 allow for charges to be made for vocal or instrumental tuition provided either individually or to groups of any size – provided that the tuition is at the request of the pupil's parents.
- 5.2. The charges will not exceed the cost of the provision, including the cost of the staff providing the tuition.

6. Transport

- 6.1. The school will not charge for:
- Transporting registered pupils to or from the school premises, where the LA has a statutory obligation to provide the transport.
 - Transporting registered pupils to other premises where the governors or LA has arranged for pupils to be educated.

7. Residential visits

- 7.1. The school will not charge for:
- Education provided on any visit that takes place during school hours.
 - Education provided on any visit that takes place outside school hours if it is part of the national curriculum or part of RE.
- 7.2. The school may charge for board and lodging, travel, entrance fees and other costs associated with the visit, but the charge will not exceed the actual cost.
- 7.3. Parents may be exempt from board and lodging costs if they can prove that they are in receipt of one or more of the following benefits:
- Income Support
 - Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
 - Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
 - Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
 - The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
 - Child Tax Credit, provided that they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190
 - Working Tax Credit run-on – paid for four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
 - Universal Credit – if they apply on or after 1 April 2018, their household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits they receive)

8. Education partly during school hours

- 8.1. The remission of charges for board and lodging payments is the responsibility of the school. These costs will be borne by the school's contingency funds.
- 8.2. Any charges for extended day services will be optional.

9. Damaged or lost items

- 9.1. The school may charge parents for the cost of replacing items broken, damaged or lost due to their child's behaviour. Parents will not be taken to court for failure to pay such costs.

10. Remissions

- 10.1. The school may be able to offer assistance to parents in financial difficulty to enable their children to participate in visits and activities. The funding is limited and there is no guarantee that all requests can be met. Assistance will be allocated on a needs basis, and if the full cost of the trip or activity cannot be met through assistance funding and voluntary contributions, the trip or activity will be cancelled.
- 10.2. Parents in receipt of any of the following benefits may request assistance with the costs of activities:
 - Income Support
 - Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
 - Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
 - Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
 - The guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
 - Child Tax Credit, provided that they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and they have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190
 - Working Tax Credit run on – paid for four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.
 - Universal Credit – if they apply on or after 1 April 2018, their household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits they receive)

- 10.3. To request assistance, parents should contact the Chair of Governors.

11. School trip refunds

- 11.1. All initial deposits for school trips will be non-refundable. Parents will be informed of this when they are provided with initial information about the trip.
- 11.2. In the event that the school has to cancel a trip due to foreseen circumstances, parental contributions will be refunded.
- 11.3. In the event that a school trip is cancelled due to unforeseen circumstances, it is at the headteacher's discretion as to whether a refund is given to parents.

- 11.4. In the event that a school trip is postponed due to unforeseen circumstances, it is at the headteacher's discretion as to what happens with the parental contributions for the trip. This could include carrying forward the money until the trip takes place, transferring the money to another trip, or refunding parents.
- 11.5. In the event that the decision is made to postpone a trip due to foreseen circumstances, it is at the headteacher's discretion as to what happens with the parental contributions for the trip. This could include carrying forward the money until the trip takes place, transferring the money to another trip, or refunding parents.
- 11.6. In the event that a pupil or their parents cancel the pupil's place on a trip, it is at the headteacher's discretion as to whether a refund is given.
- 11.7. Where a pupil or their parents have previously cancelled a place on a trip and received a full refund, the school has the right to refuse to allow the pupil to attend future trips and visits.
- 11.8. In the event that a pupil cannot attend a trip at the last minute, e.g. due to illness, it is at the headteacher's discretion as to whether a refund is given.
- 11.9. Once trip arrangements have been booked and confirmed, if contributions exceed the total cost of the trip, a refund will be given where the excess is greater than £1 per pupil. If the excess is less than £1 per pupil, this will be paid into the school's account.
- 11.10. Excess expenditure will be subsidised by the school fund.
- 11.11. The school will deal with cancellations and refunds on a case-by-case basis, ensuring that all pupils and their families are treated equally.
- 11.12. If a parent wishes to make a complaint about refunds, they can do so via the Complaints Policy.

12. Monitoring and review

- 12.1. This policy will be reviewed annually by the governors and headteacher at the Finance and Resource Committee meeting.
- 12.2. The next scheduled review date for this policy is November 2020.
