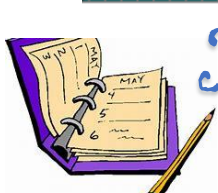

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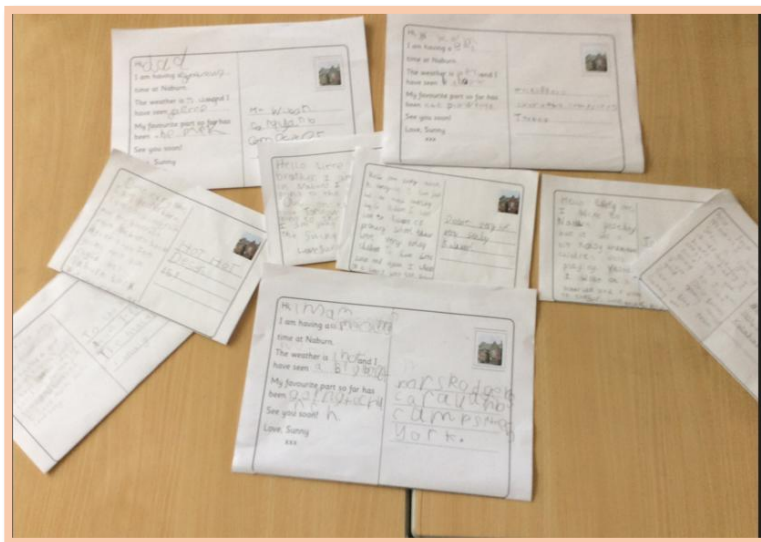
Acorn Class

All day and night she makes the great world brighter.

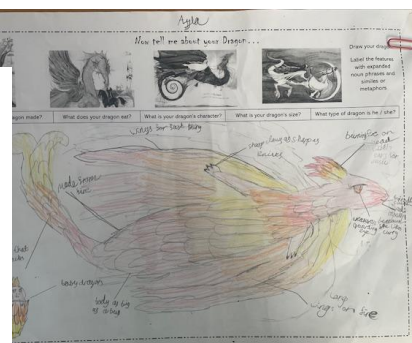
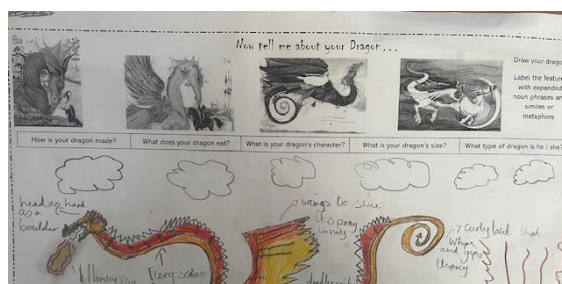
My spicy dragon eats curry as spicy as one hundred chillies.

She can always give me warm cuddles.

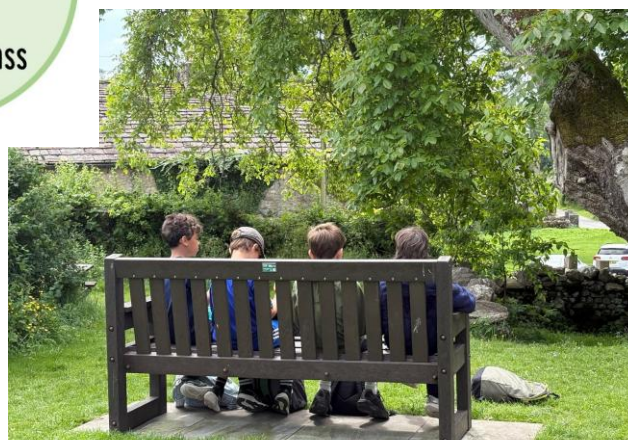
